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Hot and Cold: The Ohio Experience

Whether you've lived here for decades, or just happen to be getting through your second semester here, you're bound to notice the drastic, constantly shifting weather patterns in Ohio. One week, snow could be falling with winds nearing temperatures in the teens, and the next week, campus turns a muddied brown and green as heat waves move through. Just what gives this state it's oh-so-temperamental climate, and is it that unique?

Ohio has a bit of a unique position geographically. It's located in Midwest USA, and while not bordering any oceans, is topped off by Lake Erie. Marking a midpoint between the Arctic and the Equator, Ohio catches temperature shifts from both. Cold fronts move down across Canada, cooling down the atmosphere and often carrying rain or snow. Warm fronts move up from the Gulf of Mexico, carrying heat and moisture that makes itself most known in the summer. These air movements are not exclusive to any one season, however, and while the tilt of the Earth affects which is most prominent, the fronts meet every day. Being a transition area between differently heated systems of air is not unique to Ohio and occurs throughout other parts of the Midwest, though it is not the only factor that plays a role in our weather.

As air moves in from Canada carrying whatever water it may bring, it also passes over Lake Erie, picking up any moisture the lake deposits into the air. This is called the "Lake Effect" and leads to heavy snowfall in the winter and strong storms in the summer. Northeast Ohio, where Walsh University happens to be conveniently located, experiences this effect the most as winds travel eastward. Southern parts of Ohio also experience this effect, though caused by Lake Michigan rather than Erie. Being a further distance from the source gives the southern regions more of a temperate, stable, climate though the difference is not large.

Air patterns and the lakes remain two of the largest influences on the dramatic shifts in weather we experience, but they are not the only ones. As Ohio is far from the sea, it is still close enough to feel the effects of hurricanes. Hurricane Ike in 2008 resulted in winds reaching speeds over 75mph, the equivalent of being inside a category 1 hurricane. Ohio also receives a varying number of tornadoes every year. In 2019 it experienced a total of 58 tornadoes, topping 2020 and 2021 combined.

Despite the temperatures rising as these words are being typed, keep in mind it may not be time yet to pack that winter coat away. Ohio may still have plenty of tricks up its sleeve.

The Musical Story of Jonathan Larson We Can't Stop Watching
