I wonder if it's true. Or perhaps it's the ravings of a loon. I do know there are many a story having a contest with death for one's life.



Movie Review: Annabelle Comes Home

Latest Installment in the Conjuring Universe Overs a Unique Balance

Horror films have always held an important place in the esteem of movie lovers. Some appreciate the emphasis on the supernatural, while others enjoy the chilling suspense of tense music and reoccurring jump scares. Others relish the laughs that come from the more low-budget productions.

Yet despite their appeal, horror movies are often plagued with a fundamental problem, namely, the glorification and celebration of a menacing antagonist.

For instance, the demonic forces so prevalent in this genre are usually represented as all-powerful, omnipotent entities, while the terrified human protagonists are ruthlessly hunted or possessed for mere entertainment value, rather than to advance the plot or confront an idea. This results in an increasingly common and clichéd lack of balance between the real evils of hell and the good of heaven that are supposed to exist in unison. Horror movies that repeatedly follow this formula create a twisted understanding of the nature of good and evil and the role humanity plays in this cosmic struggle.

Seemingly as an antidote to this predicament, this past summer's Annabelle Comes Home finally offers a refreshing, balanced depiction of light versus darkness on the big screen.

Based on case files of real-life paranormal investigators, this seventh installment in the fear-laden Conjuring Universe details attempts to contain the power of the haunted doll Annabelle, who has plagued homes with unholy activity for decades. Captured and locked away by exorcists Ed Warren (Patrick Wilson) and his wife Lorraine (Vera Farmiga), the doll's threat appears to be finally contained. But when a well-meaning character begins searching for answers about the afterlife, she unwittingly reawakens Annabelle and numerous other spirits, initiating a night of terror for those now trapped in the Warren's home.

It is with this premise that the film raises unique ideas about the power of darkness over light and vice versa. Rather than representing demons as omnipo-



tent and uncontainable, Annabelle Comes Home suggests that evil has power only if the characters willingly allow it a presence in their souls.

For example, one individual is so obsessed with contacting a deceased loved one that she is willing to throw away all spiritual caution in a craze to receive forgiveness. Her disregard for protecting her soul, not the unstoppable power of the demon, is ultimately what results in her demise.

Alternatively, although certainly frightened, another character is resolved to fight Annabelle, focusing on the good of the divine world with a confidence that "not all ghosts are bad". Her steadfastness further implies that the power of prayer and the strength of family is enough to defeat any adversary.

Adding to this theme, an even more startling scene depicts a potential victim of Annabelle's wrath wielding a crucifix like a shield while screaming the Our Father fervently (and successfully) for deliverance.

Depictions such as these allow themes of good and evil to clash openly and honestly, focusing on the character's meaningful choices, rather than the "irresistible" power of dark spirits or the "unstoppable" influence of demons.

Fans of the genre may find that giving both good and evil their due does not always mean a happy ending, but it certainly results in a more satisfactory viewing than the typical horror film. Annabelle Comes Home possesses DVDs everywhere on October 8th.

Men's Soccer Winning Streak

The Walsh University men's soccer team played during the month of September with a record of 6-1-1. Their single tied game came in a double-overtime on Wednesday, September 18th. Their only loss during the season came at the hands of Alderson Broaddus 3-1 on Thursday, September 26th.

As of now, Walsh is in 2nd place in the G-MAC behind Lake Erie and Tiffin. The Cavaliers will host Lake Erie on Sunday, October 6th. Lake Erie is at the top of the conference. If Walsh is able to get a win, they would be leading the conference, depending on what Tiffin accomplishes in their game.

In Walsh's last game, they defeated Ohio Valley 3-0. This victory came on Saturday, September 28th at Ohio Valley. Walsh got their first goal in the 64th minute. Their next goal came in the 70th minute from Nathan Kett, which was Kett's third goal during the season. The last goal for the Cavaliers came in the 84th minute from Hayden Walbeck, which was Walbeck's second goal on the season. Steven Taylor had both the assists for the two goals.

Senior forward Dwight Van Dyke leads Walsh in goals with seven during the season. He also has one assist. Freshman Goalkeeper Ethan Burawa has an 80.4% save percentage, allowing only nine goals in seven matches. He has 37 saves on the season.

The rest of the season is all conference play for the Cavaliers. If Walsh can continue their winning streak, they will still have to face both Lake Erie and Tiffin. Lake Erie is the next game for the Cavaliers on October 6th at 3:00 PM at Len Milazzo Field. The matchup against Tiffin will be played at the end of the month.
