Walsh Football Finally has a Place to Call Home

When the Walsh Cavaliers and Tiffin Dragons met at Larry Staudt Field on September 3rd at 2:00 p.m., a new chapter of Walsh football history began. Walsh finally has an on-campus stadium to call home.

Walsh started playing football in 1995, and prior to the Larry Staudt Field, the Cavaliers have played in several different stadiums.

When the football program started at Walsh, the Cavaliers played their home games at North Canton Hoover High School's football stadium. Eventually, the Cavaliers moved their home games to Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium. Most recently, Walsh played their home games at Bob Commings Field at GlenOak High School while Larry Staudt Field was being constructed.

Larry Staudt Field has also been serving as the home stadium for the Cavaliers' men and women's lacrosse teams and men and women's soccer teams since Spring 2021.

While Larry Staudt Field is open and the home to many Walsh sports teams, when funding is secured, there are plans to make additions to the stadium. Construction to build Larry Staudt Field began in the Fall of 2020.

The construction of Larry Staudt Field included a three-phase plan that would allow for the Cavaliers' lacrosse, soccer and football teams to utilize the stadium. The first phase of this three-phase plan included taking out the grass field that previously sat on the current site of Larry Staudt Field and replacing it with field turf. That phase was completed in Fall 2020.

The second phase included the addition of the stadium's scoreboard which, includes a video screen. That phase was completed in Spring 2021.

The third phase included building the press box and seating for approximately 1,000 people on the west side of the stadium and was completed in 2022.

For now, the field is ready for use. The additions planned for the stadium once additional funding is secured include adding another press box and more seating for approximately 2,500 people on the east side of the stadium. Along with these planned additions, there are also plans to add locker rooms near the stadium. Finally, the Cavaliers have a home stadium to call our own.

Walsh Soccer Team Kicks Off Their Season


