Final score after set one, Walsh 25-Northwood 17. To start out the first set, the Cavs did not hold back. The girls were on the same page, moving as one cohesive team and caused the Wolves to call a timeoutearly into the set with the score just at Walsh 9, Wolvles 6. The Cavs were not holding back delivering a stellar start.

The gym was electric, everyone in high spirits going into set two. President Collins even made an appearance to cheer on the girls, wearing converses with Walsh colors and logo on them.

The girls were on fire in set 2, moving like a well-oiled machine. Minimal errors, great communication and good passes seemed to set them up for success. Northwood called another early timeout as Walsh gained a nice early lead: Walsh 7, Wolves 1.

Northwood calls their second timeout with Walsh 19, Wolves 16. The next couple of points were super intense. Back and forth the points went for a while. Unfortunately, after a great rally Walsh loses set three, Walsh 27, Northwood 29.

## Men's Soccer Earns National Ranking After Strong Start to the Season

After posting a 7-0-1 record to start the season, the Cavaliers Men's Soccer Team was ranked as the 11th best team in Division 2 in the latest United Soccer Coaches poll on September 20th.

The Cavaliers started off the season winning three games in a row against non-conference opponents. The first two games of the season were home games against Slippery Rock, which resulted in a 4-1 win for the Cavaliers, followed by a 5-1 victory against Salem.

The Cavaliers then traveled to New York for two games to conclude non-conference play. The first of the two road games resulted in a 2-1 win for Walsh against Roberts

Wesleyan in Rochester New York. The second game resulted in a 1-1 draw against Daemen in Amherst, New York.

The Cavaliers returned home to begin conference play against Ashland, which resulted in a 2-0 win for the Cavaliers. Walsh then traveled to Cedarville for the first road conference game of the season, ending in a 1-0 victory for the Cavaliers.

Walsh returned home for two games during homecoming week on campus. The first of the two homecoming games resulted in a 4-0 victory for the Cavaliers against Kentucky Wesleyan. The Cavaliers concluded the two-game homestand with a 2-1 victory over Findlay. After defeating Findlay and posting a 7-0-1 start to the season, the Cavaliers were recognized nationally as the 11th team in the nation.

In the Cavaliers' first game since earning the #11 ranking, Walsh traveled to Tiffin, where the game resulted in a 3-3 draw. Throughout the eight-game stretch that earned the Cavaliers the #11 ranking; Walsh has shown dominance on both sides of the ball, scoring 21 goals while only allowing 5 goals and posting shutouts in three games all in a row.

The Cavaliers are building off a successful 2021 season that ended in a fourth-place finish for Walsh. The Cavaliers posted an 8-4-2 record in conference play and a 12-5-3 record overall.

Last season concluded the 2021 season with qualifying for the GMAC conference tournament, where they won their first game in the quarterfinals with a 3-0 win over Findlay, followed by a tough season-ending loss to last year's #1 team in the conference, Lake Erie, in the semifinals.

# **Football Suffers Tough Loss** to Quincy

After jumping out to an early lead and being ahead at halftime, the Cavaliers faced a strong second-half performance by the Quincy Hawks to lose a hard-fought game.

Walsh jumped out to an early lead after kicker Chuckie Hanchett continued his strong start to the season, kicking a 20-yard field goal to give the Cavaliers a 3-0 lead early in the first quarter. The Cavaliers expanded their lead early in the first quarter when Kharion Davis rushed 24 yards for a touchdown. Following the extra point by Chuckie Hanchett, Walsh held a 10-0 lead early in the second quarter.

Quincy's first score of the game late in the second quarter of a Walsh safety made the score 10-2 in Walsh's favor by halftime. Quincy got off to a quick start during the second half, scoring a touchdown less than a minute into the third quarter, off a 74-yard touchdown pass. However, the Hawks attempted a two-point conversion after scoring the touchdown to tie the game.

This, however, failed, but Walsh still had a 10-8 lead. Walsh's first offensive possession of the second half resulted in an interception, which gave Quincy the ball in good field position. This was followed by a 35-yardd field goal, which gave the Hawks an 11-10 lead over the Cavaliers early in the third quarter.

Walsh quickly responded to Quincy taking the lead on the Cavaliers' next offensive possession with a 31-yard field goal by Chuckie Hanchett, which gave Walsh a 13-11 lead in the third quarter.

Quincy retook the lead late in the third with a 22-yard field goal to give the Hawks a 14-13 lead. The score would stay the same until late in the fourth quarter, when Quincy scored a touchdown off a 15-yard touchdown run to give the Hawks a 21-13. This lead was followed by a 43-yard touchdown run on the Hawks' next offensive possession, giving Quincy a 28-13 victory over the Cavaliers.

On the offensive side of the ball for Walsh, Tom Vatter led the Cavaliers in passing yards with 243, and Don Jennings led the Cavaliers in rushing yards with 53, while Keyshawn Johnson led the Cavaliers in receiving yards with 83.

On the defensive side of the ball, Marcus Shellenbarger led the Cavaliers in tackles with 7 total, 2.5 tackles for loss, and 1 sack, while Cam Hollobaugh forced the only turnover of the day for the Cavaliers with an interception.
