
met some wonderful people who share the same interest as me. If you're a Walsh student and are interested in horses, why not join the Equestrian Team?


## Walsh University Agape Retreat 2019

#### Favorite place to be on campus?


"Wherever the people are."

## **Early Struggles for Walsh Football**

Two weeks deep into the season and the season has not been in Walsh's favor. A tough week one loss came at the hands of Duquesne as the Cavs lost 44-3 at Duquesne.

Week two was Walsh's first home game as they hosted the Ashland Eagles Saturday September 14th. This game was an improvement for the Cavs as they only lost 34-12, but the scoreboard does not give the Cavs enough credit.

Walsh's defense led the way for the Cavs, as the offense was not able to generate much action throughout the game. The offense was just short of 200 yards of total offense. Junior running back Koby Adu-Poku finished the game with 20 carries for 58 yards. He did more damage in the passing game, as he racked in 4 receptions for 68 yards. Nick Gassman went 11-28 for 147 yards with 1 touchdown and 2 interceptions. Tight End Dillon Smith's lone reception went for a touchdown, and it came in the 2nd quarter with 3 minutes left in the first half.

The Cavs went into half down 20-6. That deficit grew as Ashland was able to get into the endzone late in the 3rd quarter to extend their lead to 27-6. However, to open up the 4th

quarter, Gassman was able to punch the ball in for a 1-yard touchdown rush to cut the lead to 27-12. On Walsh's two touchdowns, they were not able to convert on either extra point. After that touchdown, it seemed that Walsh had a chance of coming back into the game only being down 15 points with a whole quarter left. Unfortunately, Walsh was not able to get into a rhythm as that rushing touchdown for Gassman was the last time Walsh would score. After this, Walsh had one last chance and was not able to get a first down at their own twelve-yard line. Ashland, with the great field position, was able to get the last score of the game to make the final 34-12.

Redshirt Sophomore Stephen Baugh had a highlight for the Cavs. Baugh finished the game with an interception, which gives him an interception in both of the 2 games for the

As the school year commenced, so did the 2019 season for the Lady Cavaliers. The Cavs finished last season with an impressive 11-2-1 record, which awarded the team third place, only two points out of first place.

Walsh has a record of 3-0-1 with wins against Slippery Rock, Saginaw Valley, and Davis & Elkins. Their one loss comes from Southern Indiana University in a 4-0 final.

On Thursday, September 5th, Walsh traveled to Slippery Rock University where they took on the Pride. Junior Hannah Bowman scored the lone goal in the sixth minute. Bowman was assisted by Freshman Sabrina Ortenzi. Throughout the game, Slippery Rock had ten shots at the goal. Senior Mickey McClanahan did not give up a single goal, finishing with ten saves.

On Sunday, September 8th, Walsh hosted Southern Indiana University. Unfortunately for the Cavs, this game was not in their favor as SIU won 4-0. SIU had twenty shots while Walsh only had twelve. Walsh had the opportunities as Senior forward Alexis Meffert had four shots with three on goal. Meffert also picked up a yellow card in that game.

Walsh did not let the 4-0 defeat affect them as they traveled to Saginaw Valley Thursday September 12th. Hannah Bowman scored the lone goal in the 25th minute. That goal made it her second on the season. Maddie Malinowski was credited with the assist. Surprisingly, Saginaw Valley leads Walsh in shots with a 17-9 difference. Mickey McClanahan came up big for the Cavs as Saginaw Valley was only able to get six of the seventeen shots on goal, which were all saved.

On Saturday, September 14th, Walsh had two straight wins as they traveled to Davis & Elkins and picked up a 3-1 victory. Brianna Sanborn led Walsh in scoring as she tucked in two goals for the Cavs in the 55th minute and the 68th minute. Senior Olivia Peters scored the other goal for the Cavs in the 16th minute. Mickey McClanahan had three saves on four shots, and the only goal that got by came in the 65th minute for Davis & Elkins.

Next, conference play begins on Saturday, September 21st at Malone.



# "Joker" Trailer Review: A Fresh Take on an Iconic Character?

As the obsession with superhero flicks continues, many would consider the most iconic big-screen villain to be Batman's arch-rival Joker, a psychopathic clown with a distinctive grin and a chilling laugh.

The Joker has been portrayed by numerous actors over the last several decades, each one boasting a distinctive interpretation of this iconic character.

Longtime fans remember Jack Nicholson's comedic, sinister performance in the 1989 version of "Batman," while the resounding hoots and howls of Mark Hamill in "Batman: The Animated Series" have become a defining element of Joker's persona.

The late Heath Ledger's commanding presence in "The Dark Knight" represented a high point for most fans, featuring an unpredictable, wildly entertaining performance that left little room for improvement--as Jared Leto's underwhelming performance in "Suicide Squad" later confirmed.

Now fans are eagerly looking forward to the upcoming "Joker," an unprecedented standalone film that features a unique origin story for Batman's nemesis. Far from being a tedious cash grab or an obligatory remake, "Joker" promises a fresh angle on a character that has traditionally existed only in the Dark Knight's shadow.

Joaquin Phoenix, an actor with an impressive resume of dark roles, dances into Gotham as Arthur Fleck, an impoverished and mentally ill comedian searching for some semblance of meaning. The film's edgy trailer depicts a broken individual, confused and baffled by cruelty as he slowly descends into madness amid images of a decaying city and a suffering population.

One scene lingers on Arthur diligently caring for his ailing mother, revealing a touch of

humanity that past representations of the Joker have had little time for. He is even shown dating a young woman named Sophie (Zazie Beetz), and his genuine smile during their dinnertime conversation makes his inevitable transformation far more painful.

Ultimately, the villainy of this Joker flows from a place of depression and hurt, not from malice or hatred of humanity. With this in mind, can viewers really blame him for the chaos and crimes that will undoubtedly ensue? Perhaps they can, but should they?

"All I have are negative thoughts," says Arthur at one point, a cry for help to a therapist who will soon leave him. Even observing the malice in his eyes, it is hard not to feel a twinge of pity for Joker, as if we somehow created him.

While his predecessors have represented the iconic Joker in a number of fashions, Phoenix's depiction seems to have something deeper to say about the humanity of comic book villains and the ramifications of trampling upon the marginalized and mentally ill in society. This is an exciting potential for a movie genre that is primarily concerned with big set pieces and massive ticket sales.

Phoenix's Joker is perhaps not the one we need but is certainly the one we deserve.
