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

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New Major in Sports Management

The new Sports Management program is designed to provide students with the academic preparation and practical training for success in the sports industry, which includes the production, facilitation, promotion and organization of any activity, experience or business focused on fitness, recreation, sport tourism or leisure. The program also presents an opportunity to specialize in one of the following areas: Marketing, Communication and Data Analytics. Graduates will be prepared with necessary skills to work in this multi-billion dollar industry at various levels and in different roles in sports organizations.

Walsh Announces New Four-Year Graduation Guarantee

In its ongoing commitment to student success, Walsh University has announced the establishment of its new Four-Year Graduation Guarantee to help students graduate on time and on budget, effective for the Class of 2024. With the guarantee, if a student meets all outlined responsibilities, but doesn't meet the requirements to graduate in four years, Walsh University will cover the tuition cost of their remaining coursework for up to two semesters, or have the option to take two graduate-level courses.

To participate, students will commit to the Four-Year Graduation Guarantee during the first month of their fall semester and follow the steps outlined, which includes declaring of a major in a timely manner, passing all course work and registering for the appropriate amount of classes each semester.

Walsh University believes in the value of the degrees our students earn. Students are also eligible to participate in the Maroon and Gold Promise, which ensures that within six months of earning their degree, a Walsh graduate will be placed in a job or further training such as an executive development program, graduate school or service/scholarship opportunity (i.e. Fulbright or Peace Corps).



Byers School of Nursing, Mercy Medical Center Awarded Grants to Advance Nursing Education

Walsh University's Byers School of Nursing was recently awarded two separate grants from the Ohio Board of Nursing's Nurse Education Grant Program for 2019-2021 in partnership with Mercy Medical Center. Walsh received \$121,872 to support the new Fast Track B.S.N. program and \$199,999 toward the M.S.N. Nurse Educator program.

Through the grant funding, Walsh's Byers School of Nursing and Mercy Medical Center will work together to prepare nurses to start their careers through the Fast Track B.S.N., while helping experienced nurses transition into teaching through the M.S.N. Nurse Educator program aimed at preparing the next generation of nurses. Programs through Walsh's Byers School of Nursing are accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE).

Walsh Celebrates First Occupational Therapy Class with Pinning Ceremony

Graduates in Walsh University's first class of the Master of Occupational Therapy program were celebrated with a special pinning ceremony on Friday, August 9. In total, 31 graduates were honored marking Walsh's first Occupational Therapy alumni.

"Being the first class of a newly established program brings a set of unique challenges. We are so proud of these students for stepping up to the challenge and exceeding our expectations," said Occupational Therapy Program Director, Clinical Assistant Professor Stephanie Bachman OTD, OTR/L, CHT, CLA. "Each one of them worked hard for this and they deserve to be honored for their determination and the growth they demonstrated over the last two years. They will always have a special place in my heart and I'm excited to be able to call each one of them my colleague."

Occupational therapy was cited as a Top 25 job for 2017 by *U.S. News and World Report*, and the Bureau of Labor Statistics expects the field of OT to grow by 27 percent between 2014 to 2024. The Walsh University Occupational Therapy Program has earned national accreditation from the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy (ACOTE) for a full five-year cycle.

New Partnership to Focus on Ethics in Medicine

Walsh University and Aultman Health Foundation have collaborated to establish a dual-appointment professorship in bioethics that recognizes the importance of the humanities in health care. Walsh Professor of Philosophy and nationally renowned bioethics expert Leslie Whetstine, Ph.D., has been named to the newly created Aultman Professorship in Bioethics at Walsh University to advise and promote ethical policies, procedures and decision-making in a clinical setting.

In her new role, Dr. Whetstine is the co-chair of the Ethics Committee and, with chair Dr. Eyad Nashawati, she will provide case consultation, draft and review policy, provide medical education, work directly with the clinical teams and serve as an ethics resource for patients, families and clinicians at the hospitals for the Aultman Healthcare Delivery System.


Walsh Welcome Weekend Ushers in New School Year

Walsh University Starts New Chapter, Welcomes President Tim Collins


“As I stood there, I was taking it all in. On a quiet May morning, Timothy Collins, Ed.D., stood alone in the middle of Walsh University’s quadrangle and slowly turned, surveying the campus in one sweep. As he paused, facing the Our Lady of Perpetual Help Chapel with the tile mosaic of Christ’s image before him, he knew, without a doubt, that he had found a home.

“As I stood there, I was taking it all in. The Good Lord talks to us in the depths, in the silence of our inner most being,” *said Dr. Collins.* “And sometimes, he inspires others to say something that we are meant to hear. Afterwards my bride, Drenda, told me ‘I have a sense of peace here that I haven’t felt on any other campus.’ And she confirmed what I had been feeling – there is something special about Walsh University.”

After officially taking office on August 5, Walsh’s seventh president has quickly become a familiar figure on campus, briskly walking to meetings and interacting with faculty, staff, alumni, students and community members as he embarks on a “listening tour” to find the soul of the University.

“In the *Rule of Life*, the Brothers of Christian Instruction are reminded ‘to discern the Will of God by listening to the Word of God and by



reading the signs of the times,” said Dr. Collins. “As I begin my journey with Walsh University, I’m taking heed of this and seeking assistance in helping to read the signs of the times by following the advice of St. Benedict who reminds us to listen. In these early days of my presidency, job one for me is to listen.”

Dr. Collins’ genuine enthusiasm for his new “Cav Nation” community has proven endearing. On campus, he is greeted as an old friend by faculty and staff alike, while students stop to pose for selfies, challenge the new president to push-ups or exchange a friendly fist-bump on their way to class. He is seemingly everywhere – whether it be chatting with guests in the David Center’s DeVille Atrium, unloading student cars during Welcome Weekend or greeting scholar-athletes on the field during early morning practice. His boundless energy is infectious, his personable approach sincere.



“Our employees are the number one resource of this University and the work they do daily is valued and important. We will not be successful with what we seek to do without all of us in this together. My hope is to create an environment in which we can unleash each individual’s potential. We need to allow people to be a part of establishing, nurturing and sustaining a culture that allows everyone to contribute to the best of their ability.”



While Dr. Collins’ first month in office has been marked by new beginnings, there is an underlying feeling of familiarity in his introduction to campus. As Walsh University turns a page in its history, it does so with a leader who has a steady grasp of the Brothers of Christian Instruction’s founding mission and a grounded commitment to the Catholic values that unite a campus.

Seven Things to Know About Walsh’s Seventh President

1. Service in Action: Dr. Collins’ self-titled “first career” was spent in service to his country and included many milestones. Born and raised in Illinois, Dr. Collins was a high school graduate at the age of 16. He chose to pursue service in the military and channeled his energy to become the No. 1 student-leader at the Air Force Academy, the youngest pilot instructor-evaluator in the Air Force and the Air Force’s youngest senior officer. From 1997-2005, Dr. Collins served as a Senior Officer in the U.S. Air Force with multiple senior command experiences during his 23 years of service in the U.S. and abroad, including command of operational or operational forces at the flight, squadron, group and wing levels. His military honors include Air Medals, Aerial Achievement Medals, Aircrew Safety Award

of Distinction, Bronze Star, Defense Superior Service Medal, Legions of Merit and the Purple Heart. He continues to serve as an FAA-certified flight instructor.

“My first career was serving the immediate needs of our nation and focused on the here and now. I believe that as citizens we have obligations and responsibilities, not just freedoms and privileges. I flew fighter jets most of my life. This was my opportunity to serve and give back.”

2. Engineering Solutions: A senior executive since 1997, Dr. Collins joined Walsh from Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory (APL) where he served as Chief Government Relations Officer for the nation’s largest university affiliated research center. APL has more than 7,000 staff members involved in technical and scientific contributions on behalf of the Department of Defense, the intelligence community, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and other federal

agencies. In addition, Dr. Collins served as the Board Secretary for APL and Chair of two graduate degree programs in the Johns Hopkins Whiting School of Engineering. Dr. Collins has strategically set visionary objectives during 14 of the last 39 consecutive years that Johns Hopkins led U.S. universities in research and development.

“APL’s mission is to provide for the government an extension of engineering and technical capabilities in the areas of national security and space. My second career was an opportunity to make sure that those who are safeguarding our way of life, our first responders and those protecting us, had the best that we could possibly produce.”

3. A Call to Catholic Education: Dr. Collins’ appointment as Walsh University’s seventh president is only the most recent step in a career of notable moments. He brings to Walsh more than 22 years of senior-level experience as a distinguished higher education professional with expertise in philanthropic endeavors, conceptualization and implementation of institutional strategic plans and a demonstrated understanding of a private university’s mission, student-centered culture and Catholic traditions.

“This career for me is all about people, about building leaders. In the Catholic intellectual tradition, we talk about education as drawing out an individual’s character. If we want to be involved in where this country is heading, then we need to be deeply involved in university life.”

4. Faith Forward: Dr. Collins is a published authority on Catholic higher education. As a national guest lecturer and scholar, he has been involved in Catholic education for nearly three decades and

earned his doctorate in higher education and organizational change with Benedictine University. Through multiple relocations, Tim and Drenda have been involved in more than 20 parishes with service and leadership roles on Parish Councils and the Knights of Columbus (4th Degree), to name a few. Dr. Collins' professional affiliations include Catholic Charities, Fellowship of Catholic Scholars and United Service Organizations.

5. Vocation of the Family: Tim and Drenda met as young adults in Georgia and have been married for 37 years. As a military

family, they were relocated a total of 21 times and have enjoyed building and sustaining communities in parishes through active participation and volunteer roles. They are the proud parents of three children and grandparents of ten. Throughout their lives together, Tim and Drenda have consistently given of their time to the Roman Catholic Church while raising their children, who are all products of Catholic elementary and secondary parochial schools and universities.

"I was 17 when I first met Drenda. She was at a school across town. We've been married for 37 years and together for 43. When I was at the Air Force Academy, she wrote me a letter every day. I still have them all. She numbered each one of them, and I saved them carefully in a box. I never went without mail."

6. Academic Scholar: Dr. Collins earned an Associate of Science degree from Georgia Military College, a Bachelor of Science degree from the United States Air Force Academy, a Master of Aeronautical Science degree from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, a Master of Science degree from the National War College and a Doctor of Education degree from Benedictine University. His extensive educational experiences include coursework at Columbia University, Georgetown University, Harvard University, Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis, FEMA's Emergency Management Institute, Air War College, Army Command and General Staff College.

As an experienced public speaker with diplomatic expertise, he has served as a guest lecturer on ethics, character development, and aviation technology development, as well as chairing a Doctoral Dissertation Committee. Dr. Collins has been teaching undergraduate and graduate coursework since 1996. He has authored numerous articles on Catholic higher education and presented at Catholic education symposiums conducted by the University of Dayton, King's College and Saint Vincent College.

7. Oath of Fidelity: Pledging to uphold the faith, morals and teachings of the Catholic Church, Dr. Collins made a public profession of faith by reciting the Oath of Fidelity to the Magisterium during the University's annual Opening Week Mass of the Holy Spirit on Wednesday, August 28. Dr. Collins took the Oath surrounded by members of Walsh's founding order, the Brothers of Christian Instruction, and University Chaplain Reverend Thomas Cebula, who accompanied him in the recitation of the Oath.

Torch Passed:

Longtime Curator of Hoover Historical Center Collection Retires, Vows to Stay Connected

When Director Ann Haines left the Hoover Historical Center on July 3, she was closing the door on a 35-year career that spanned the folding of an iconic company and the guardianship of its legacy. Now in her retirement, she looks forward to enjoying her new title, "Center Volunteer."

"I was with the Hoover Company for nine years I had my second daughter. I left to stay home full-time, but I guess God had different plans for me," said Haines. "I was home for about three years before I got a call from Hoover's Human Resources Office about a part-time position at the Historical Center. At first, I declined. But one thing led to another, and the position turned into


full-time job for me. That was the summer of 1984."

The Hoover Historical Center is the Victorian boyhood home of Hoover Company founder William H. Hoover. The Center, located inside Walsh University's Hoover Park, is the original Hoover family farmland, which now includes beautiful award-winning gardens tended by volunteer members of The Herb Society. The mission of the Hoover Historical Center is to preserve, promote and educate the public on the life of W.H. "Boss" Hoover (1849-1932) and history of The Hoover Company up to 2008, after manufacturing ceased and Hoover headquarters was closed.

"The history of the farm spans close to a century," Haines said. "It represents a significant time in Hoover and North Canton's history."

For most of the 20th century, Hoover was among the most popular and profitable makers of vacuum cleaners in the world. Founded in 1908, Hoover started out making leather horse saddles and automobile seats at the homestead. By 1916, the company had become so successful in the production of vacuums that it had to build a massive downtown factory to handle the ever-increasing demand for its products. Although Hoover would go on to set up manufacturing facilities all over the world, North Canton remained the company's headquarters for decades.

Ann Haines began her tenure at the Hoover Historical Center as an assistant to the Director Stacey Krammes. The Museum had opened officially less than 10 years before in 1978 as a part of the Hoover Company's 70th Anniversary. Krammes was only the Center's second director.

“Stacey really brought life to the Museum. She knew that you had to have community involvement,” said Haines. “You have to have volunteers to help run events and contribute to new programs. So she really got the volunteer program up and running and helped launch The Herb Society, which is now in its 35th year as well. I learned so much from her in those early years.”

During her tenure with the Center, Haines witnessed many milestone moments. In 1997, the Hoover Historical Center home, barn and tannery had to be moved further inside the Hoover Park. The entire home was lifted from its original foundation, placed on a truck and carefully moved 400 yards west of its original location. Due to faulty hydraulic equipment, the Victorian home was actually dropped in the midst of the move but did not sustain any damage.

“The move was incredible. We had to carefully pack up every item in the house. We even have a video and scrapbook about the whole experience. I’m still in awe about how they did it,” said Haines. “When we opened after the move, it was one of my proudest moments. I worked with the Hoover Company graphics department on new displays and the interior design had all been renovated to Victoriana at its finest. I felt we were better than before.”

Haines also saw the acquisition of the 30-acre Hoover Park and Center by Walsh

University in 2004 and the sad closing of the North Canton Hoover plant facility in 2007, marking the end of an era. For more than 30 years, Haines personally greeted guests from all over the world, including Europe, Sweden and Russia.

“I’ll miss the people who visited. I especially loved the stories about how the Hoover name is alive and well in England, but it’s now a verb. In London, you’re not vacuuming, you’re ‘hoovering’ the carpet. I still don’t

know why that never caught on here in the United States.”

Most of all though, Ann will miss the volunteers, which is why in her retirement she has decided to become one.

“The Center holds a very strong presence in this community. Our volunteers are not just from Canton, they are from all over the region. We all work together to keep the Hoover legacy alive,” said Haines. “I can’t imagine not being a part of the Hoover Historical Center in some way. There are just too many things I would miss.”

Owned and operated by Walsh University, the Hoover Historical Center is located at 1875 E. Maple St., North Canton, Ohio 44720-3331, inside Hoover Park and across the street from the University.

“While I love working with the collections and discovering hidden artifacts, I also love working with and meeting new people who visit the museum,” said Early. “I’m excited to return to my alma mater, and I’m looking forward to learning more about the Hoover family and The Hoover Company. I know the obvious, but I know there is so much more to their story.”

Since assuming her new position in July, Early has made it a habit to take time out of each day to organize and sift through the Center's archives in the basement.

“People think of this as the vacuum cleaner museum, but there is so much more that the Hoover family did for North Canton and the world in general. There were advances in technology, engineering, marketing, advertising and more that continue to influence our lives today. I look forward to sharing that side of the story.”


basketball in Romania before returning to the United States. Hicks was inducted into the Walsh Wall of Fame in 2014.

"Walsh helped to prepare me for the professional writing in my career today, and I appreciated learning from other students on a small campus with a diverse international community."

After graduation, Navarre spent more than a year in South Korea teaching English and then returned home and made her entry into the U.S. Federal Government with a short stint at the Transportation Security Administration in Virginia.

"At TSA, I also continued to learn more about languages from travelers while they passed through security," said Navarre.

Next, Navarre transferred to the Department of the Interior in Virginia to be a human resources assistant and served there for three years before pursuing an opportunity to join the Department of Justice Office of the Inspector General at the San Francisco field office. In her role as program analyst, Navarre seeks to detect and deter waste, fraud, abuse and misconduct in DOJ programs and personnel, and to promote economy and efficiency in those programs. Coworkers with accounting degrees have the position title auditor, and those without are referred to as program analysts. Navarre's regional office conducts audits mainly on the West Coast, Hawaii and Alaska.

"I have been enjoying learning about the financial and budgeting aspects of the government," said Navarre. "I'm also thrilled to have a career that allows me to continue to travel and learn about a variety of programs."

PT Grad Lands Dream Job with Major League Baseball

As both a Walsh undergraduate and graduate physical therapy student, Ryan Bitzel '04, '06 had one goal in mind, to leverage his love of baseball into a career in sports medicine. That goal became a reality in 2018 when he got a call from the Seattle Mariners to join the team as a major league physical therapist.

"There are only 30 teams in Major League Baseball, and not all of them employ a PT on the medical staff," said Bitzel. "These positions rarely open up."

Bitzel's primary responsibility is to work with MLB players on the injured list so that way they can rejoin the active roster. He also works alongside the team's athletic trainers,

and during games you'll find Ryan in the dugout monitoring the players with the athletic training staff in case an injury occurs.

"Traveling with the team is a great perk of the job. I've gotten to see a lot of the country and play in ballparks that I only dreamed of seeing on TV as a kid," said Bitzel. "Playing catch with rehabbing players on the field is still a 'pinch me' moment."

Bitzel cites Walsh's physical therapy department for their support and encouragement in pursuing his dreams and securing his first clinical with the prestigious Steadman-Hawkins of the Carolinas, Greenville, S.C., which is one of the more highly regarded sports medicine and orthopedic clinics in the country. After graduation, he joined the staff full time and served as a consultant for the Greenville Drive Minor League Baseball team. In 2010, he received a phone call from the San Diego Padres and joined their minor league rehabilitation staff as a coordinator at the spring training complex in Arizona. His "call-up" from the minors to the majors happened in 2017.

"Out of the blue, I received the phone call that I had waited my whole life for from the Seattle Mariners. My very first major league game was Opening Day 2018. This is a special day in baseball, as they introduce the team, as well as the staff, on the field to the home crowd before the game," said Bitzel. "After 12 years in the minor leagues, to be able to stand out there on the line and hear my name called, with my parents sitting in the front row...it's a moment that I will never forget. My story just reinforces the point that you don't have to go to a big university to accomplish big dreams."




Alumni Welcome Letter Campaign

Welcomes His Eminence Francis Cardinal Arinze



While Walsh has hosted prominent Catholic leaders in the past, welcoming a Cardinal to campus is a rare opportunity for any Catholic organization.

Walsh University had the esteemed privilege of hosting His Eminence Francis Cardinal Arinze of Nigeria to campus on Tuesday, September 17, for the Celebration of Holy Mass of the Memorial of Saint Robert Bellarmine in the Our Lady of Perpetual Help Chapel.

During his visit, the Cardinal met with Walsh President Dr. Tim Collins and local religious leaders, and shared remarks on the topic of “The Church and our Young People” with students and theologians in the Barrette Business and Community Center.

“Jesus Christ is the way, the truth and the life. I see it written on the entryway of your beautiful Chapel here. Christ gives meaning to our lives. He gives a sense of unity to the various things we do,” said His Eminence during remarks to students. “Life is not just one senseless thing after another. The various things we do during the day are parts of a mosaic that makes sense. Christ gives all that a sense of unity and direction. With Christ, we know where we are going.”

Francis Cardinal Arinze was ordained a priest in 1958 for the Archdiocese of Onitsha, Nigeria. When he was 32, he became the youngest Catholic Bishop in the world and served at the Coadjutor Archbishop for his

home diocese. Cardinal Arinze is a member of the Special Council for Africa of the General Secretariat of the Synod of Bishops. He was also a close advisor to Pope St. John Paul II, who elevated him to the cardinalate and appointed him head of the Pontifical Council for Interreligious Dialogue in 1985. In 2002, he was named Prefect of the Congregation of Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, which he now serves as Prefect Emeritus.

“Having Cardinal Arinze here on campus was a great blessing for Walsh, especially for the students,” said Walsh senior Fred del Guidice. “The Cardinal made it a point to stress the importance of young people in

the Church today. He encouraged them to get involved and take roles of leadership and responsibility. In this way, he helps us realize that the Church is not merely a hierarchical institution but is also a community of believers that we all can play a part in. God has given each one of us various skills and abilities. We must do our best to utilize those to serve His Church.”

Cardinals are designated by the Pope to assist in the administration of the Church at the highest level. Collectively known as the College of Cardinals, they are the most senior officials under the Pope. Cardinals also elect the Pope when that position becomes vacant and have done so since 1059.





Beloved professor Tom Ling passed away September 5, 2019, after a battle with liver cancer.

Tom was born

He attended local Catholic schools and entered the Brothers' novitiate in 1944, taking his final vows as a Brother of Christian Instruction in 1950. In 2017, after calling Walsh's campus his home for 12 years, Br. Marcel moved from La Mennais Hall in North Canton to live with the Brothers of Christian Instruction in La Prairie, Canada. His involvement with Walsh spanned the history of the University, from his first appointment to the Board of Directors in 1964 to leadership positions over the years including sociology professor, academic dean and interim president.
