"Working in higher education is such a fun industry," Majesti says, "especially in my role where I can get really involved at the college. I interact with students, our faculty, and other units across the university on a daily basis. I've been involved with higher education since college, and it's been such a blast. I'd definitely recommend it!" Previously, Majesti worked for Case Western Reserve University directly after graduation from Walsh. When asked about the interview processes, Majesti mentioned the critical role that her Honors Thesis played as an experience to emphasize. "My thesis project was the star of my portfolio for both my interview processes. For Ohio State, my project on the Flint Water Crisis was one of the ways I connect-

In terms of advice for future graduates, Majesti notes that finding the one job that sticks or turns into a longtime project does take some time, and it is important to be patient throughout the process. Eventually, the right opportunity will present itself and things will work out how they should! She assured me not to worry as I navigate this process myself. Instead, she advised me to trust the process and know that I will end up exactly where I am supposed to be. Majesti has just started her career and is already so successful! Her wisdom is sure to carry her through her future endeavors. She plans to stay in the Columbus area for the next few years, and is looking forward to continuing to grow and expand her skillset.

Similar to Majesti, Grace Andreski has soared since graduating from Walsh University! Receiving her diploma in Marketing less than a year ago, Grace currently works for the Detroit Pistons as their social media manager. She describes this as the life she could only dream of - "being fresh out of college, I am experiencing and being exposed to so many amazing things at such a young age. I get to travel all over the USA with the team, meet lots of cool people, work events and games that most people just attend for fun, create content, and watch my ideas come to life!"

Grace describes her interview process for her current position: "I had to go through seven different interviews. I talked to a lot of people - HR, social media manager, social media director, VP of brand marketing, SVP of marketing, and the Chief Business Officer. The process took a month and a half. I later learned that I had gone up against 1,000 other applicants for my job title." Grace cites her strong work ethic and personal experience in the Honors Program as what got her where she is today. Her story also exemplifies the importance of being a multifaceted individual in today's world. It is crucial to be persistent and have a strong sense of professionalism within any field.

While at Walsh, Grace was not only a great athlete on the lacrosse team, but an exceptional graphic designer and student. She describes the importance of utilizing all available resources while in school: "Take advantage of all the opportunities Walsh provides! Reach out to people that are working in careers you would enjoy. Use your thesis as a way to get your dream job by relating it to what you want to do." For her senior thesis, Grace studied social media and its effect on fan behavior in professional sports. She saw this as a huge opportunity, and utilized this project to further her network. She states that she was "lucky enough to build strong relationships with the people [she] interviewed," and even had a few offer her post-graduate jobs.

Overall, both Grace and Majesti agree that you need to trust the process, a phrase coined as one of Prof. Jennifer Vokoun's (Design Professor) life mottos. Grace goes on to say that "the hardest part of landing a job is getting your resume seen. If you have gotten to the interview portion, be confident in your abilities that you got there. You belong in every room, situation, opportunity,



or interview you're put in." These powerful words come from her personal experiences - and should be taken to heart! Another one of my favorite nuggets of wisdom is from Majesti Brown: "take life at your own pace!"

Majesti states that "There's a lot of pressure as students and recent graduates to always have a plan and succeed immediately. However, that's not always the reality. Professor Zana Zawahri is an integral part of both the Nursing Department and Honors Program, helping students to combine these two challenging fields of study. She graduated from Canton Central Catholic High School and from Xavier University, receiving her BSN. She furthered her education, pursuing her MSN in Nursing Education at Walsh University. She has been a nurse for 13 years, with experience in both the Emergency Department and Infection Control and Prevention. She has been teaching at Walsh since 2015 and became a full-time faculty member in 2019. Currently, she teaches Population Health, Pathophysiology, and the Nursing Capstone.

Professor Zawahri is well known for her caring attitude and passion for mentoring students. She helps an abundance of nursing majors as their class advisor and helps guide the Honors nursing students as they navigate their classes in combination with the two-year thesis project. She states that mentoring is her favorite part of the job as she helps students to filter their thoughts and ideas into a realistic project. By challenging them, she feels that she can help them to gain knowledge about the research process, which will aid them throughout their careers.

Her love of mentoring came from her own great advisors that helped her as she was navigating her own undergraduate education. Zawahri speaks fondly of her first clinical instructor, populations mentor, and academic advisor. All three challenged her to grow as a student and taught her important lessons, such as remembering that healthcare needs to go beyond the hospital. It is evident that she was inspired by her great mentors and wants to take on that role for current nursing students here at Walsh.

Professor Zawahri's wisdom that she shares with her students is beneficial to all disciplines here at Walsh. She preaches time management and the importance it can have in balancing school and the other responsibilities that students may have. Another tip she gives is to speak up if there is an issue and seek out faculty members that can help, because they are there to listen and help in any way they can. She encourages students to explore interests outside of their major, and take classes that spark their interest to become a well-rounded professional after graduation.

Professor Zawahri shares her love of nursing by teaching topics that she is passionate about and mentoring students to become the best nurses that they can be. She continuously guides students through very challenging times because she sees the potential in every student she encounters. Course Feature: Innovator or Impostor?

"Does Thomas Edison deserve all the credit that he gets, or were there people behind his successes that we fail to acknowledge?" This is the question Professor Thomas Roblee asked on the first day in Honors 222: Honors Art and Music. But how does this question connect to music? In the same sense, throughout the course, the class looked at multiple music genres and examined the most famous artists from each one. The purpose of this investigation, which took into consideration the culture of the time, was to determine, as a class, if each artist should be considered a true innovator. From the blues, to classical, and even rock n' roll, this class learned about artists such as W.C. Handy, Beethoven, and Elvis, while each time, asking this same question: "Were they truly an innovator, or merely an impostor?" But, how does one decide who is an innovator is and who is not? As a class, a list was made on what was believed to separate an artist from a true innovator. Words such as curiosity, creativity, and pushing boundaries are examples of what made it onto this list. When talking about innovators, Professor Roblee stated, "I am passionate about exploring music and thought it was interesting to note who the innovators were throughout time and why they are the innovators who have lasted. I also want to point out the fact that there were a lot of good music creators who were not innovators but were working in the structure someone else already created."

Much to the Honors Program's purpose, this class challenges its students with critical thinking, writing, and listening skills in dealing with a wide variety of music. Professor Roblee explains that unlike a non-honors class, "The Honors students really dig into the multidisciplinary side of things, and then explore it in a more research-based type of way rather than a survey of music. It explores the why and how of these developments taking shape." Throughout the eight weeks of this course, students are asked to write an essay each week about different artists. The essays varied in subjects such as deciding whether an artist was an innovator or impostor, or choosing between two artists and deciding who had the greater impact on music. The students then use the research they found for their essay for a debate the next day in class. The best example of this was an essay and debate deciding on who they believed to have the bigger impact: Mozart or Beethoven. The debates often got heated as each side tried to reiterate their points. Freshman Jacob Faehnle recalls his favorite part of the class was debating different musical subjects with his fellow classmates. Each member of the class brings to the table a new viewpoint on why they believe that their points were more convincing, which allowed for a continual expansion of the topics. New perspectives are seen from every student, and by the end of the class, Professor Roblee himself chooses what he believes to be the winning side.


Student-Athlete Highlight: Logan Ison

"I think that my time management skills and prioritization has definitely grown since freshman year, and this has trickled into my academics and athletic experiences. I am confident now that I know what I can handle, and how to best go about it when I have a lot going on."



Mid-East Honors Association Conference

On April 21st-23rd, three of Walsh's Honors students attended the Mid-East Honors Association (MEHA) Conference in Indianapolis to present their senior thesis projects alongside many other college students from across the Mid-East US region. Below is a short bio on each of these amazing students and their research.

Yi-hsuan (Rebecca) Tsai, from Kaohsiung, Taiwan, created a children's book for her thesis project, entitled: An Anti-Bias Storybook that Initiates Discussions about Diversity with Readers (Advisor: Dr. Jennifer Green, Reader:

Dr. Eugenia Johnson-Whitt). With this project, Rebecca wished to create a storybook for children that teaches them how to respect and accept diversity and new cultures. Her story follows the experiences of a class as they welcome a young girl from Taiwan named Jenny, who must embrace a new school and new country. Rebecca sees herself in Jenny, as they are both from Taiwan and went to school in Ohio; however, as an education major, she also relates to the teacher, who encourages her class to appreciate everybody's differences. Her book consists of two chapters with beautiful illustrations,




valuable lessons promoting anti-bias and anti-racist attitudes, fun class activities, and thought-provoking discussion questions to aid in learning.



Francesca Sberna, another graduating honors student, utilized her thesis project to help understand how teachers and parents have perceived the impact of COVID-19 on students, academically and socially (Advisor: Dr. Nina Rytwinski, Reader: Dr. Yanmei Xu). Through a series of interviews with teachers and parents, Francesca concluded that both parents and teachers noticed declines in social and academic skills. Teachers noticed more academic decline than parents did, while more parents noticed an increase in mental health struggles like depression and anxiety. Francesca was excited to combine her interest in the effects of COVID-19 and her future goal of becoming a counselor.

Myla Demko tied for 1st place at MEHA for the presentation of her poster! Congratulations Myla! Myla wrote

her thesis on the current student achievement in Walsh's organic chemistry labs (Advisor: Dr. Amy Heston, Reader: Dr. Tim Smith). Myla identified the program student learning outcome (PSLO) that applied to the sample of labs she was studying, and evaluated how well students were able to understand the concepts. Ultimately, Myla noticed that most students excelled at following lab safety techniques, but struggled with learning new material. Her recommendations to help students understand content include: create homework assignments based on the lab concepts, create online practice questions, and show physical or video concept demonstrations. She hopes that this research will help improve the course for future students.
